





SECOND PREPARATORY MEETING TOWARDS CRES+5 (2024)





CONCEPT NOTE AND AGENDA

Puebla, Mexico | September 5 and 6, 2023



Background

As a prelude to the <u>World Conference on Higher Education in the Twenty-first Century: Vision and Action</u> (WHEC, 1998), UNESCO agreed to hold five regional preparatory conferences in Havana (November 1996), Dakar (April 1997), Tokyo (July 1997), Palermo (September 1997) and Beirut (March 1998). These regional conferences are understood as a prelude – of a consultative nature – to the world conferences on higher education, a practice that has been shared by the different regions ever since.

• First Regional Conference on Higher Education – CRES 1996

The Havana preparatory meeting (hereinafter CRES 1996) was led by the Regional Centre for Higher Education in Latin America and the Caribbean, now the <u>UNESCO International Institute for Higher Education in Latin America and the Caribbean</u> (hereinafter UNESCO-IESALC). This meeting debated new visions of higher education that contrasted with the dominant market and economic rationalism of the time. It also emphasized the importance of the processes of internationalization of higher education in a globalizing context, stressing the need for Latin America to commit to integration based on the convergence of its own regional identity. The conclusions and commitments of this meeting were embodied in the <u>CRES 1996 Declaration</u> and the <u>1996 Action Plan</u>.

CRES 1996 represented a turning point, a milestone in the development of higher education in the Region, as it succeeded, among other things: (a) to raise a broad debate on the issue of higher education, positioning it on the Latin American and Caribbean agenda, and at the same time it constituted a valuable contribution to the WHEC 1998; (b) to root the "culture of quality" and detonate processes of quality assurance and accreditation on the Latin American agenda; and (c) to urge interregional cooperation in response to a liberalizing context that was already showing signs of new initiatives (MERCOSUR 1991), Association of Caribbean States (1994), among others. The resounding success of CRES 1996 led to the successive editions of this meeting, making it today the most important event in the area of higher education in the region.

A follow-up meeting to WHEC 1998 (Paris, 26-27 June 2003) evaluated the <u>Framework for Priority Action</u> agreed at WHEC 1998 and issued new recommendations <u>WHEC 1998+5</u>. As a contribution, UNESCO IESALC produced a report entitled "<u>Reform and innovations in Higher Education in some Latin American and Caribbean countries, 1998 – 2003</u>". This report concludes that after five years since 1998, several important changes have taken place in regional higher education oriented towards its modernization, mainly in the areas of quality assurance and technological appropriation, as well as a greater awareness of the academic communities regarding the role that higher education should play in the transformation of societies.

• Second Regional Conference on Higher Education – CRES 2008

The second edition of the Regional Conference on Higher Education (hereafter CRES 2008) was held in Cartagena de Indias, Colombia, on 4-6 June 2008. The event was once again convened and led by UNESCO IESALC, with the support of the Colombian Ministry of National Education.

CRES 2008 was sponsored by the Ministry of Education of Brazil, the Ministry of National Education of Colombia, the Ministry of Education, Social Policy and Sport of Spain, the Secretariat of Public Education of Mexico, the Ministry of Education and Culture of the Eastern Republic of Uruguay, and the Ministry of Popular Power for University Education of the Bolivarian Government of Venezuela. CRES 2008 was sponsored by Capes and CNPQ of Brazil; the Colombian Association of Universities, Colciencias, and the Convenio Andrés Bello of Colombia; the Spanish Agency

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for International Cooperation for Development and the Centro Extremeño de Estudios y Cooperación con Iberoamérica of the Kingdom of Spain.

CRES 2008 reaffirmed the principle that "higher education is a public good, a social and universal right, and that it has a strategic role to play in the sustainable development processes of the countries of the Region".

The reflections and commitments of CRES 2008 were embodied in the <u>Declaration</u> and <u>Plan of Action</u> that served as tools for the reconfiguration of regional higher education, reformulating it under new terms, and outlining a horizon of meaning in which its leading figures share values that are already the hallmark of the event (education as a public good, human right and duty of the State, cooperation in solidarity, equality with equity, among others). The Declaration of the Third Meeting of University Networks and Councils of Rectors of Latin America and the Caribbean, held in Lima, Peru, was part of the CRES 2008, and was based on the construction of the <u>Latin American and Caribbean</u> <u>Space for Higher Education</u>.

From 5 to 8 July 2009, UNESCO convened the States Parties to the <u>Second World Higher Education Conference</u> <u>"The New Dynamics of Higher Education and Research for Social Change and Development"</u>. Its leading figures reaffirmed the status of higher education as "a public good and a strategic imperative for all levels of education, and as a foundation for research, innovation and creativity, higher education must be the responsibility of and financially supported by all governments".

• Third Regional Conference on Higher Education – CRES 2018

The third edition of the Regional Conference on Higher Education (hereafter CRES 2018) took place in Cordoba, Argentina, from 10 to 15 June 2018. CRES 2018 was held in the framework of the first centenary of the 1918 University Reform, which took place in the city of Cordoba. The participants of the CRES 2018 experienced the celebrations planned by the city on the occasion of the Centenary of the Manifiesto Liminar, and sealed the commitment and the urgent decision to build a future of prosperity and good living for the countries of Latin America and the Caribbean in the <u>Declaration</u> and <u>Plan of Action 2018-2028</u>.

A new edition of the <u>World Higher Education Conference</u> held in Barcelona, Spain (hereinafter, WHEC 2022) made it possible to reflect on old concepts and capture their resonances, as well as to introduce new ones and interconnect them without breaking the dialectic between past and future, in an attempt to build a common vision of the future, a tool that UNESCO considers indispensable to strengthen international cooperation in the field of higher education. This opportunity was particularly interesting because the COVID-19 pandemic has meant a radical shift that opens up new scenarios, accelerates trends, and alters previous projections of the future.

UNESCO, aware of the need for higher education to be well informed of the expectations of the outside world in order to adopt the necessary anticipatory role to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world, is convening a <u>follow-up meeting</u> to CRES 2018 to be held in Brasilia (13-15 March 2024).



• Third Regional Conference on Higher Education ('Follow-Up') – CRES 2018+5

Prior to the follow-up to CRES 2018 in Brasilia on 13-15 March 2024, UNESCO IESALC considered it appropriate to hold a consultation in the city of Cordoba, Argentina, on 22-23 March 2023 with a view to approving the agenda of CRES+5, rethinking its thematic axes and reaching a consensus on the mainstreaming of the COVID-19 pandemic in all of them.

After the successful conclusion of the consultation held in Córdoba, the preparatory meeting for CRES+5 will be held at the <u>Benemérita Universidad Autónoma de Puebla</u> (BUAP)¹, Puebla², Mexico, on 5-6 September 2023. This meeting constitutes a new instance of dialogue and interlocution between the actors of regional higher education that seeks an active participation in the agenda of the CRES+5, as well as a collective reflection on the conclusions of the Third World Higher Education Conference - <u>Roadmap</u> (Barcelona, Spain, 2022) that will allow for the reconfiguration of the <u>CRES Action Plan 2018-2028</u> in new terms, particularly in light of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the 7 thematic axes debated during CRES 2018, as well as on the new thematic axes developed by UNESCO IESALC at the request of the participants in the Córdoba meeting (March 2023) and which have subsequently been extended to 12 with the guidance of the Brazilian government.

UNESCO IESALC finds it necessary to hold this mid-term meeting (CRES+5) in order to monitor the impact of emerging issues on the global education agenda (e.g., COVID-19, de-globalization, new international geopolitics, disruptive technologies such as ChatGPT, etc.) and to reflect this impact in the documents discussed in each of the different thematic axes addressed at CRES 2018. Prior to their presentation at the CRES+5, as previous socialization mechanisms, the BUAP provides the appropriate space to host and sponsor this regional consultation.
